
Researchers examined 112 cat cases of lily exposure, comparing inpatient and outpatient treatment outcomes. Acute kidney injury (AKI) prevalence was similar in both groups, with 46.9% of inpatients and 43.8% of outpatients affected. Inpatient survival was notably higher at 100%, compared to 86.5% for outpatients.
