The Companion Animal Parasite Council's latest forecast highlights the growing prevalence of vector-borne diseases such as anaplasmosis, ehrlichiosis, heartworms and Lyme disease in pets across the US. The expansion is largely attributed to shifting populations of ticks and mosquitoes. The diseases are largely fatal and also pose threats to people, so year-round prevention is essential, says veterinarian Brian Herrin, CAPC board president.

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
