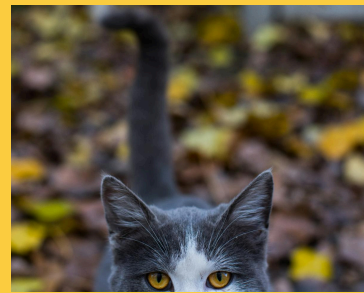

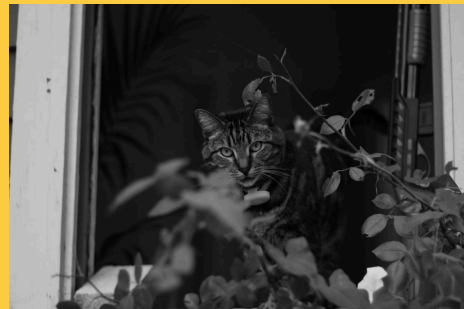

Declawing in Cats is Associated with Neuroplastic Sensitization and Long-term Painful Afflictions

Researchers analyzed data from eight studies to separate declaw-related pain from osteoarthritis in aging cats. Declawed cats showed heightened pain sensitivity and nerve abnormalities. Findings highlight the impact of chronic post-declaw pain and support the need to develop therapeutic strategies to alleviate chronic pain in DOA cats.
